### COURSE CONTENT OUTLINE

- 1. Introduction: Art terms, various art history approaches, roles of artists, and basic styles of representation (realism, abstract, and non-representational).
- 2. Early Modernism: The beginnings of Early Modernism through Impressionism and Post-Impressionism.
- 3. **Expressionist Movements of the early twentieth century**: The further development of Modernism through the expressionistic styles of Fauvism, Cubism, Futurism, Dada, and Surrealism.
- 4. Art in North America: The effects of Modernism in North America and how it is manifested in the United States, Mexico, and Canada.

- 5. **Architecture**: The development of architecture under the influence of modern materials like steel, and its transformation into the International style that has become world-wide.
- 6. Art since 1945: The shift of the art world from Europe to the United States through Abstract Expressionism and its effects into later twentieth century art such as Pop Art, Minimalism, Feminist Art, Earthworks, and the use of new technologies.
