#### COURSE CONTENT OUTLINE

Required topics include:

- Washington State constitution
- Washington State government and elected officials
- Washington State Native American culture and sovereignty of the tribes

At least two of the following topics must be included:

- Lewis and Clark exploration
- The Oregon Trail
- Railroad expansion
- Geologic features and six geographical regions within the context of Washington State history
- Natural resources and renewable energy within the context of Washington State history
- Washington State agriculture within the context of Washington State history
- Grand Coulee Dam project, Irrigation District development and agricultural impact/growth
- Or other topic at instructors discretion as approved by the department

# **DEPARTMENTAL GUIDELINES**

This course will satisfy the .5 (1/2) high school WA State History credit for HS21. WAC 180-51-061 Independent study may be approved by instructor on a topic related to Washington State government, constitution or history.
